MONONUCLEOSIS (MONO)

Mono is caused by an infection with the Epstein-Barr virus, a virus in the herpes family of viruses. There are new strains to this virus so people may get mono more than once.

Mono is frequently referred to as the "kissing disease" because you can catch it from the saliva of someone who has the virus. But because it's transmitted through saliva, a person doesn't need to kiss someone to get mono: It can also be contracted by sharing a toothbrush, drinking straw, water bottle, or eating utensil with someone who has the virus.

Symptoms usually appear 4-7 weeks after you've been infected with the virus. Symptoms are:

- *being tired all the time
- *fever
- *sore throat
- *loss of appetite
- *swollen lymph nodes
- *headaches
- *sore muscles
- *larger than normal liver and spleen
- *skin rash
- *abdominal pain

Mono can't be cured and needs to run its course naturally over about 4-6 weeks, and some people feel tired for several weeks longer. The virus may be active for several months.

Even if you have several of these symptoms, don't try to diagnose yourself. Always consult your doctor if you have a fever, sore throat, and swollen glands or are unusually tired for no apparent reason.
